





## PARKING ENFORCEMENT

There are several ways you can report parking issues. Please note that depending on the situation, it may take up to 48 hours for a response.

- To report a parking nuisance in front of your home or business, please use the “Report Nuisance Parking” page on [orlando.gov](#) or contact the Transportation Engineering Division at 407.246.2281.
- To report illegal parking or parking on the lawn, please use the “Report a Code Enforcement Violation” page on [orlando.gov](#) or contact the Code Enforcement Division at 407.246.2686.
- To report illegal on-street parking that is preventing emergency vehicle access, someone blocking your driveway where you cannot exit, or an abandoned vehicle, please contact the Orlando Police Department at 321.235.5300.



## PARKING DO'S

- Read and obey all parking signs
- Park as close to a curb as possible within 12 inches
- Park in the same direction as traffic
- Lock your doors and remove all valuables from sight

## PARKING DON'TS

Do not park:

- Where prohibited by signage or a red or yellow curb
- In such a manner as to block
  - Public or private driveways
  - Any part of a sidewalk
  - Wheelchair ramps
  - Access to commercial dumpsters
- On bike lanes
- In any space specifically designated and marked for persons with disabilities, unless a parking permit is displayed as required by State Law
- Within 20 feet of a crosswalk
- Within 15 feet of a fire hydrant
- Within 30 feet of any flashing beacon, stop sign or other official traffic-control device, or railroad crossing
- Within 30 feet of an individual's mailbox between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m.
- On-street for a period longer than 72 hours
- A commercial or recreational vehicle on a public street, except for loading or unloading purposes



**Don't park less than 10 feet from another parked vehicle across the street, to maintain access for public service vehicles (school buses, fire trucks).**



## PARKING REVIEW

The Transportation Engineering Division evaluates on-street parking and requests for restrictions in residential areas. On-street parking is generally allowed on both sides of a street with a curb-to-curb width of 24 feet or more and low traffic volume typical of residential areas. There can be exceptions to this that relate to the curvature of a street or the context of the neighborhood design. Locations are reviewed on a case-by-case basis to determine the need for the addition of a yellow curb and/or parking signage, in order to reinforce City Code.

## RESIDENTIAL PARKING PETITION PROGRAM

Transportation Engineering has a residential parking petition program, through which property owners on a residential street may request to add, change or remove on-street parking restrictions. Please keep in mind that:

- Petitions will only be considered on a block-by-block basis. No mid-block or partial block requests will be considered. A block is considered to be a roadway segment between two side streets or between two intersections.
- Property owners on both sides of the street must be included in the petition, even if the request will only affect parking on one side of the street. The property owner is considered to be the person/entity currently shown as the owner on the Orange County Property Appraiser's website.

**There needs to be a large consensus (approximately 90%) among property owners within the block before approving a parking change. A number of unintended consequences can result from parking changes on one or both sides of a street, including: increased travel speeds, drivers ignoring restrictions, removal of parking signs and complaints about lack of routine parking enforcement due to resource limitations.**
